Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

I like to start my day, if possible, with swimming laps in the Waimea pool. When I come to swim first thing in the morning very often the wind from the night before will have blown leaves into the pool that then will have sunk to the bottom. This has been especially true in our windiest months of March and April.

So, I have fun diving for the leaves and bringing them up to the water's edge so that the pool filter does not get clogged. The lifeguards appreciate the help because trying to vacuum leaves from the edge of the pool can be a hassle.

But then, I lament the leaves as well. I think about the trees getting enough water here on the Westside to produce the leaves. I hope the soil has the nutrients that can allow for photosynthesis. For sure we always have enough sunshine! Leaves are a magnificent part of Creation. They give us shade. They give us mulch. They give us oxygen so we can breathe and live.

I take in their oxygen deeply before I dive for the now-dead leaves at the bottom of the pool. Everything is quiet and calm underwater. It is indeed a different world. I stop at the bottom of the pool with a handful of leaves to look back up at the other world above the surface. The world from that vantage point is mostly blue sky and sunshine sparkling. Rain dancing on the surface of the water is also great to see. After a minute or so, I have to surface again.

Here is my be-leaf: "Leaves are like God; they give me the air I breathe, but they also take my breath away!" And like how we might take leaves for granted, we tend to not to think about everything God does for us everyday and how we are fully dependent on God. Our lives are just here for a season, but still with good reason.

We notice such things as gas prices, trash pick-up days, and whether our cell phones are charged. Would that we could check for God as often as we check our messages? That we could find that vantage point if even for a few minutes to see God from a different place. And, if we were to see God, we would be left breathless!

This is so important because like leaves, we are only here for a season and then are swept away—into the pool filter of history or short remembrance. Jesus tells us in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6) to "consider the lilies of the field." They are here, and then they are no more. God creates them. God dresses them in beauty and light. God scatters their seed for the next season.

My be-leaf is that God's hand is coming for us. We live this life, grow, provide what we can, and fall away. In the depths of our despair the hand of Christ comes to raise us up again. This is the glory of the Easter season that we are not left simply at the bottom of the pool! God gives breath, and takes our breath away!
